## **Amendments**

To change the Constitution, an amendment can be proposed (written) and ratified (approved). There are two ways to propose an amendment. Congress can write an amendment and pass it with a two-thirds majority vote in both the House of Representatives and the Senate. Secondly, two-thirds of the state legislatures can tell Congress to have a national convention to propose an amendment. Once an amendment is proposed, the amendment must be ratified, or approved, by three-fourths of the state legislatures (38 out of 50 states) or by ratifying conventions in three-fourths of the states. This process ensures that any changes to the Constitution have lots of support from both the federal government and the states.
